In the group that arrived yesterday were Bankers, Manufacturers, Executives, Contractors, Agriculturists, Doctors, Automobile Salesmen and other professions. D. W. Brosman retired Government Official of Albany figured among the arrivals to San Juan. There were two couples from New Jersey and Chicago.

The Honorable Manuel Vallecillo, Past President of the Rotary Club, Santurce informed the visitors they would subject to the acts created for them during their stay on the Island. The distinguished Vallecillo who has been in charge of the Rotary entertainment said that between the activities in effect there will be a concert by the Choir of the University; a trip to ElYunque; a trip to Treasure Island in Cidra and other sites of historic interest of San Juan and the Island.

The Rotarians of the metropolitan area tomorrow will take the visitors to places where they can enjoy a good meal to the warmth of a real Porto Rican place(so they say). In the receiving Committee to the Rotarians from Georgia figured among others, Louis E.Soler, Rodolfo Catinchi, Rafael Lopes Cefero, Anibal Martinez, Andres Gonzales and Julito Ramiry.

Tuesday at 1:30 P.M. after the arrival at San Juan, the Rotarians of Ga. were invited to the Airport Restaurant for lunch. The distinguished Vallecillo spoke concerning Porto Rico, included among other things, their economical structure, the historic method of industrialization and programs of livelihood. The distinguished Vallecillo affirms that for 1960, the program of industrialization, that the Governor will carry out, will have some 80,000 persons working with a marked nominal of more than one hundred million dollars.

He said, 53 percent of the population are 19 years old or under, and to their judgement their education has been completed. Ha also explained that in the United States 33 percent of the population are under 19 years of age. The distinguished Vallecillo told the Rotarians of Georgia that the illiteracy on the Island has been reduced to 20 percent and that in this respect their country was situated in fifth position in the Hemisphere. He explained that their annual production is one billion three hundred million twenty thousand dollars and assured us that Porto Rico constitutes the world's third trading with the United States. He affirmed to this respect that their tax trading has always been within the first ten.

AT THE AIRPORT

Among the Rotarians of the State of Georgia who made us a visit of Good Will during the four days, who were invited by the Rotary Clubs of the Metro-politan Zone of San Juan, there was one who came as a soldier who was among the North American troops that invaded Porto Rico in the year 1898.

This was Mr. W. B. Brosnan, who is now 75 years of age. He was one of the soldiers of the First Regiment of the Infantry of Georgia, under the command of General Brooks. They entered Porto Rico by way of Ponce and finally arrived at San Juan only to return to the Continent one month later, worn out and tired, but proud of the Spanish on the Island. Mr. Brosnan did not remember Porto Rico too well, but I heard him say that any one visiting Porto Rico now would find it a country completely changed and for him it was a new country. He has never been back to the Island since the time he came with the troops at the invasion of 1898. He said he was enchanted with his four day stay in San Juan. In Albany, Georgia, Mr. Brosnan was chief of the fire department for 41 years. He retired in 1953 after half a century of service in the organization. It is amazing to know that in all the time he was chief of the Fire Dept. of Albany, Ga., there was never a person who perished in a fire in that town, but he himself suffered a grave accident while combating a fire. He injured the structure of his spine, this was in 1939.

During the last years of service he had to go around accompanied by a nurse due to the injury of his vertebre, he now walks with difficulty.

During the 1931-1932, Mr. Brosnan was President of the International Association of Fire Departments. Another thing he is very proud of is that while he was Chief of the Fire department in Albany, Ga., they had the lowest type of insurance against fire of all the Southern States.

Mr. Brosnan is a tall and stout man. Even at his 75 years of age, he is well preserved and still has plenty of strength. He and Mrs. Brosnan have five sons.

No había vuelto a la Isla desde que vino con las tropas de invasión en el 1898. Dijo que había sido "encantadora" su estada de cuatro dias en San Juan.

En Albany, Georgia, el señor Brosnan fue Jefe de Bomberos durante 41 años. Se retiró en el 1953 después de medio siglo de servicio a la organización. Se ufana de que en el tiempo durante el cual fue Jefe de Bomberos de Albany ninguna persona pereció en un incendio en aquella ciudad.

Pero el mismo sufrió un gra-

Pero él mismo sufrió un grave accidente mientras combatía un fuego. Se lesionó la espina dorsal. Esto fue en el 1939. Durante los últimos años continuamente ha tenido que andar en compañía de una enfermera. Debido a la lesión en la vértebra camina con dificultad.

Durante el año de 1931-32; el señor Brosnan fue Presidente de la Asociación Internacional de Bomberos. Otra de las cosas que tiene a orgullo es que mientras fue Jefe de Bomberos la ciudad de Albany tuvo el más bajo tipo de seguro contra incendios entre todas las ciudades de los estados del Sur.

They also came back impressed by the courtesy and good manners of the Porto Rican people, including their pleasantness and their way of guiding the poor people of the Island.

The art of knowing the people of a foreign country(even though Porto Rico is a Territory) of the United States, their language, customs and culture are different from ours) consists in knowing them if only half way, to demonstrate to them that one desires to be their friend and to try hard to learn their language and their way of living.

Georgia and Porto Rico accomplished great things in this trip of Good Will. If we could only learn to visit people of other lands more often on the basis of friendship, there would be without doubt much less misunderstanding of this tired world and such misunderstandings would disappear between smiles and handshakes.

It's the magic ingredient in the pressure can sold under the name of "Off." While Off just hit the counters of the drug stores in recent months, backed by a strong advertising program hailing its powers it is leaving all the other repellents on the shelf.

Dr. Robert B. Scott, a supervi-sor in the Hercules laboratory, told about Delphene in the course of a talk to the St. Simons Island

Rotary Club yesterday.

It was discovered by the United States Department of Agriculture and Hercules found it was equipped at the Brunswick plant to turn it out, he said. Materials, including an ingredient made by another Hercules plant, are shipped here for processing.

The repellent is so effective that present facilities can't turn out enough. The plant is doing all it can and meantime Hercules is awaiting market reports to determine if a plant will be constructed just to produce Delphene. Only Brunswick is now making it in quantity.

Dr. Scott says he thinks it is the best material found thus far, "pretty high class stuff."

In his talk he traced the establishment of Hercules in 1913 as result of an anti-trust order which required DuPont to set up two competitions in the powder making field. Hercules bought the Yaryan plant here in 1920.

From one product, powder, it went on to 800 products made by six divisions in most of the 48 states

and England.

The plant here uses virgin pine wood stumps as its raw material. The stumps are ground and crude rosin dissolved from them with a solvent. From the crude comes various refined rosins, Bin-zol, Belro, and oils. The oils include turpentine, pine pil, anethole, and terpin hydrate.

But right now the focus is on Delphene. Sorry, said Dr. Scott, no sales at the plant.
