Iain Brown is a delightful young Scotsman attending Georgia Southern University in the Masters Program. He wore his kilt and traditional Scottish blouse, shoes and kilt hose (socks). With the aid of a slide show he told of his family and country. His father is a Professor of Dentistry and his mother is an elementary school teacher; he has a 25-year old sister, Jacqueline. His home is ten miles north of Glasgow. Scotland is a country smaller than Georgia with a population of five million. The capital is Edinburgh.

Scotland is famous for several people: Sean Connery, of Agent 007 fame; Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone; John Baird, the inventor of the television; and Sir Alexander Fleming, who discovered penicillin. Golf as we know it today originated from a game played on the eastern coast of Scotland in the Kingdom of Fife during the 15th century.

Famous places include Loch Ness, home of the monster; and Edinburgh, home of the famous castle. A national dish is haggis. Scotland is also known for a drink, Irn-Bru, that is sold there more than Coke. Add to that kilts, which are very important to its history; bagpipes (they actually came from France); and highland cows.

The GRSP, Georgia Rotary Student Program, has been very meaningful to lain. There are 72 students representing many nations. He has learned a great deal about other cultures. Conclaves are held for the students, such as a weekend in Atlanta visiting Six Flags and CNN. He has experienced southern fishing and deer hunting complete with a four wheeler. He is assigned to two host families, one of which is the family of our own David Williams. Iain spent the Christmas holidays with the Williams' family and he stated that they made him feel completely at home. Iain concluded the program by playing the guitar and singing Scotland's adopted national anthem, "Flower of Scotland." Iain is a credit to GSRP and we wish him much success.
