Captain Allen W. Price Leadership



Captain Price is a graduate of Glynn County Academy (1964), U. S. Air Force Academy (1968), U.S. Flight School (1969), Georgia State (1977) and Georgia Tech (1995). He was an Air Force pilot before entering the commercial airline business and retiring as Chief Pilot of Delta Airlines. Captain Price is now a private consultant focusing on leadership development.

Captain Price's speech centered on life's lessons and was filled with personal experiences. Many people lack a sense of perspective, confusing what is important and what is not, while others confuse egocentric ambitions with value. He stressed the importance of reviewing constantly one's perspective. Many find it easier to continue on a chosen course of action, even after they have evidence that it is the wrong course. Referring to the 9/11 tragedy he stated that all anti-terrorism measures in place at the time were designed to fight terrorism as terrorism was known up to that date, while the terrorists were fighting the next war, with means no one had anticipated.

Another vital concept is that one should always be aware of one's three distinct fields of knowledge and expertise, which are: (1) what you know, (2) what you don't know and (3) what you don't know you don't know. The latter one he referred to as the red zone. Successful people are lifelong learners, who learn from their mistakes and failures, rather than from their successes. Captain Price was appointed Chief Pilot on August 1, 2001, 42 days prior to 9/11. In its aftermath, he had to deal with the emotional and traumatic consequences on crews. During a crisis, communications is vital to rein in a breakdown in procedures, since everybody tends to question the existing procedures and processes. Allen referred to Dr. Earl L. Wiener's law, which he called the law of unintended consequences. Every time one solves a problem, one creates a new problem, which, of course, one hopes is of a smaller magnitude than the problem solved. He concluded his speech by enlightening the audience that the Chinese language uses two symbols for the word crisis. One symbol represents danger and the second symbol represents opportunity. A brief Q & A session closed a very edifying meeting.
