Don Fielder introduced today's guest speaker. Carolyn was born in Rhode Island and earned her bachelors and masters degrees from the University of Rhode Island, both in Statistical Science. Her masters thesis focused on the evolution of longline catch rates for large coastal sharks along the Atlantic coast. She is now completing her PhD. She and her husband live at White Oak.

Carolyn's presentation (including visuals) provided a wealth of interesting information and concentrated on sharks in our area of the world. Among the items discussed were shark hatcheries, species, over fishing and the undesirable results, productive biology, studies and objectives, and field methods. Sharks common to SSI are the Atlantic sharpnose, bonnethead, blacktip and sandbar. Carolyn concluded the presentation with a Q&A session.

He's a grand ol' flag salesman

Cal Paynter's enthusiasm is flagging.

If you see a flag on St. Simons Island, especially a good one, chances are it passed through Paynter's hands. The longtime St. Simons Island Rotary Club member peddled flags for more than a decade to fund the club's public events.

Paynter, 85, grew up in Philadelphia, the birthplace of America, he calls it. It's a place where American flags are common and he was accustomed to seeing them. He was surprised when he retired to St. Simons Island. "I started looking around on Veterans Day," he said. "I saw more Halloween flags than American flags. I said, 'Hey, we've got to do something about this.' "

So he went back to the Rotary Club with a proposal to spread patriotism with flag sales. With proceeds from its flag sales, the Rotary club bought more flags and put one in every classroom. It put up nice flag poles in busy public places, such as the triangular park at the entrance to St. Simons Island, at Neptune Park in the village and at the crossing of Frederica and Demere roads, the island's busiest intersection. It didn't stick with just American flags. It sells state flags and flags from other nations, including the flags of nations that attended the G-8 Summit on Sea Island a few years ago.

Paynter figures the club has raised about \$75,000, some of which is used annually to fund Taps at



Twilight, the immensely popular Memorial Day observance at Neptune Park.

Paynter has done more than sell the flag. He defended it. During World War II, the city boy enlisted in the Army and, along with his skiing friend and Temple University classmate, Lewis Troutwein, volunteered for the ski troops of the 10th Mountain Division. "I was the only guy in my company who had never skied," he said.

The 10th Mountain Division still is celebrated for one of the most astonishing feats in the war. As the Army slugged its way toward the important Po River valley in Italy, the Germans dug in on Mount Belvedere and Riva Ridge, blocking the advance. Believing it impossible to scale the sheer face of 1,500-foot Riva Ridge, the Germans defended it with only a battalion. But on the night of Feb. 18, 1945, F Co. of the 86th Regiment, Paynter's unit, and other troops began climbing the icy rock face. "We didn't make it to the top by sunrise. But right at dawn, a fog came up and saved our lives. The Germans couldn't see us. It was a miracle," he said.

The surprise was complete; the American troops drove the Germans off the ridge and took Mount Belvedere the next day. Paynter's friend Troutwein was killed in action. His favorite memory of an American flag came on VJ Day, when his troop ship docked in Ocean City, N.J., he said. "A lot of people had American flags on the boardwalk," and Paynter walked among them and enjoyed the return of peace, he said.

His vision now dimmed with age, Paynter can't see flags very well. Unable to drive, he has passed the flag to other Rotarians. One person can't do it the way Paynter did, said Joe Mruk, who took over sales. Pat Storino does invoicing, while Frank Sidella handles warehousing. The old ski trooper will be honored in Friday's Veterans Day parade on St. Simons. He'll be riding in a 1933 convertible that will be hard to miss. It will be the one with the sign that says, "Flag Man."
