## Last Week's Program: May 1, 2012

## The Turkish Invasion! The Rotary GSE Team from Turkiye Present Their Country!

Leaving the luncheon on May 1st, this writer heard a number of fellow Rotarians say, "that's one of the best presentations we've had all year!" Agreed! A team of five from Turkiye (actually pronounced Turk-yea) visited our Rotary Club and shared a wealth of information about their fascinating country and its compelling history going back over 10,000 years!

The Rotary GSE team consisting of team leader and Rotarian Ilknur Ozer, and colleagues Deniz Alpan, Elif Cevlik, Illkin Sengun and Onur Ozer, gave comprehensive presentations on the many faces of Turkiye, each one delving into specific aspects of the country including history, economic life, trade and commerce, geography, and customs and traditions. Did you know that Turkiye is considered the geographical center of the earth, where three continents converge – Asia, Europe and Africa? Or that Istanbul, (its largest city), is the only metropolis in the world that spreads across two continents – Asia and Europe (Asia Minor). Did you know that the ancient name for Turkiye is Atatolia – meaning 'land where the sun rises?' Did you know that Turkiye is the only secular Muslim country amongst the world's 54 Muslim nations? Or, that the Virgin Mary lived her final days in Turkiye in the ancient city of Ephesus, which was during her time,

one of the largest cities in the world with a population of over 250,000 people?

Turkiye was the first civilization to have a currency (circa 2000 BC), the first written agreement (1284 BC), and the first man in flight – Hezarfen Ahmet Celebi in 1612. And we thought we had an impressive history. Turkiye, with its 75 million citizens, is a founding member of the United Nations, a member of NATO, and is presently a candidate for the European Union which regulates the European currency and trade system based on the Euro. Turkiye has 7 regions, 81 provinces, and is the world's 15th largest economy based on its gross national product. Turkiye's leading trading partners are Russia, the United States, and the European Nations. Key industries are agriculture – the world's leading producer of hazelnuts, figs, cherries, apricots and pomegranates, and 2nd in watermelons; manufacturing – producers of textiles, clothing, televisions (largest in Europe), electronics, and automobiles (Fiat, Renault, Hyundai and Ford among others); and tourism – American visitors contributing some \$80 million in 2011 alone.

And now we know all of these interesting facts about Turkiye because a very nice GSE group from the Middle East visited our Rotary Club and shared their pride of country with us, and some Turkish folk dancing (although thankfully, not the Whirling Dervish), making it a most enjoyable St. Simons Rotary luncheon, indeed!
