# **January 15, 2013** Wilf Nicholls **Director, State Botanical Garden of Georgia**

**Introduction by Rotarian Martin Turbidy** 

Born in London, England, Wilf Nicholls graduated with a B.Sc. (Botany) from the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth in 1972 and then a Ph.D. (Botany) from the University of British Columbia in 1984.

He spent 22 years in Vancouver, first as a graduate student, then as an entrepreneur, then 9 years as a research scientist at UBC Botanical Garden. There, he managed the Plant Introduction Scheme and bred 'Mandarin' honeysuckle and 'Starbright' mock orange. In 1997 he moved to St John's, Newfoundland, to take up the position of Director



of Memorial University of Newfoundland Botanical Garden. After 13 years in that position he came to Athens in September 2010 as director of the State Botanical Garden of Georgia and has recently been cross-appointed into the Department of Horticulture.

Wilf has taught undergraduate classes in applied biology and plant biology, established an ornamental R&D program called *Plant Atlantic* and joined a team to investigate the potential of native rose species as sources of food and medicines. He was part of the National Recovery Team for the endangered Limestone Barrens plant species of Newfoundland's Great Northern Peninsula and headed a team on the research and awareness of invasive alien species.

# Brandon Speeg – Conservation Coordinator Dr. Linda Penfold – Research Director White Oak Conservation Center

Fellow Rotarian Page Faulk introduced our guest speakers for January 8 from the White Oak Conservation Center.

Hard to believe that we have a world-class research and conservation zoo right here within a one-hour drive from our island. White Oak, located just across the state line in Yulee, Fla., is a globally integrated conservation initiative and zoological facility focusing on research and preservation of rare animal species - particularly large mammals and birds. With over 25 unique species under White Oak's conservancy, their menagerie includes the rare white rhino, cheetah, the elusive okapi which is a close relative of the giraffe, Florida panther, eastern bongo, the eland (the largest in the antelope family), and large exotic birds such as the Sandhill crane and the blue-gilled curassow.

Their website calls it — A unique refuge for people, animals, and ideas. Located along the St. Marys River, White Oak encompasses 7,400 acres of forest and wetlands. The Gilman Paper family acquired the property in 1938, and White Oak is still owned and operated by the Howard Gilman Foundation. White Oak promotes endeavors in the arts and wildlife conservation through creative science, education, training, and collaborations. Among their key initiatives is the breeding of exotic endangered animals through their SEZARC program (South-East Zoo Alliance for Reproduction and Conservation). SEZARC successfully conducts state-of-the-art breeding programs which produce hundreds of animals each year including cheetahs and rhinos — two species which are extremely difficult to propagate in captivity. Through artificial insemination and other reproduction techniques, SEZARC has successfully produced 147 cheetah cubs in captivity which amount to 30% of all the cheetahs bred in the U.S. Many of these animals are then provided internationally to zoos meeting the highest standards.

Surprisingly, this unique conservation facility is open to the public offering educational workshops, corporate retreats, children's camps, a 100-person capacity meeting facility and even a golf course. As our speaker Brandon Speeg expressed, "White Oak is all about animal conservation, and animal conservation is about <a href="mailto:people">people</a> – making the connection between people and animals."
