

March 19 Program Timothy S. Mescon, Ph.D. Shift Happens

If you thought you might take a little power nap after lunch last week, you were mistaken. Dr. Timothy Mescon, President of Columbus State University, was our speaker and his energy and vibrance lit up the room like a rocket. *Georgia Trend Magazine* has named Mescon one of the 100 most influential people in Georgia. No wonder. He's taken Columbus State to new heights in what *U.S. News and World Report* has called one of the top 35 business schools in the nation.

Mescon came to talk about change. Change in the way America thinks, does business and designs products. "Change is the norm today," said Mescon. "The world is a very turbulent environment. Industries are hyper competitive. The days of resting on one's laurels are over. Today, business is compelled to constantly reinvent their products and services or be trampled by competitors on a faster track. The shelf life of a business solution is getting shorter and shorter because... shift happens."

Mescon talked about smart marketers like Apple and Square Inc. Remember MP3 technology? Invented in 1992 by the German company Fraunhofer-Gesellshaft, Steve Jobs took that technology, created the iPod and the way we listen to music has never been the same since. "It's all about *portability*." People want to be able to access information on demand. That's why Apple has been so successful. Jobs really understood the portability concept and invented products that gives people immediate access to information, anywhere. The iPad and the iPhone both fit this requirement to a tee.

"Anyone know what a dongle is?" Mescon asked. It's a relatively new device from Square, Inc. that plugs into a smart phone instantly making it a credit card swiper and a portable store for any entrepreneur wanting immediate access to credit processing. Again, it's all about *portability!*

"And, it's about *strategic agility*. Besides being smart, marketers have to be fast, focused and ferocious!...because *shift happens* and you've got to be agile and ready to make the change again."
