Program: September 25, 2012 Alex Atwood Georgia Congressman - District 179 - Glynn County

Introduced by fellow Rotarian Martin Turbidy, State House Representative Alex Atwood graced our lectern with a topic that resonates in the hearts of us all — *The United States Constitution*. It was apparent from the start that Congressman Atwood is a historian, beholding a particular reverence for this regal document. "What have I learned in my first year in the Georgia House of Representatives?" he asked as an opening statement.

"Working in the State House is like herding cats. I've learned the meaning of diplomacy, to keep my sense of humor, and not to take myself too seriously." Then he got to the good stuff – *The United States Constitution*. As it appeared, Mr. Atwood is a student of the Constitution. "Written 226 years ago, it has stood the test of time. Only five hand written pages and 4,400 words long, it is the oldest and shortest written constitution of any major government in the world. It contains just 7,591 words including the 27 amendments.

"To put it all into perspective," continued Atwood, "when the Constitution was signed, the United States' population was 4 million. It is now more than 309 million. Philadelphia (where it was signed) was the nation's largest city, with 40,000 inhabitants." Benjamin Franklin who was gravely ill and carried into the convention to sign the document, was 81 and the oldest delegate to sign. As Benjamin Franklin left the Pennsylvania State House after the final meeting of the Constitutional Convention on September 17, 1787, he was approached by the wife of the mayor of Philadelphia. She was curious as to what the new government would be. Franklin replied, "A republic, madam. If you can keep it." Curiously, the word "democracy" does not appear once in the Constitution.

He talked about George Washington, a humble man of amazing stature who was embarrassed when asked to serve as our nation's first President. Atwood reflected that Washington even apologized in advance on the day of his 1887 nomination for "the errors I might commit."

The Constitution document took 54 delegates 100 days to frame, with only one 10-day break, requiring its authors, debaters and supporters many sleepless days and nights in relentlessly stifling summer heat to finish. This miraculous effort has stood the test of time. As evidence of its continued flexibility, *The Constitution* has only been changed seventeen times since 1791. In Atwood's view, it is that flawless a document.

"The essence of *The Constitution* is that people respect it." reflected Atwood. "When we disregard its purpose and content, out Republic will fold."..."Many other constitutions of the world give more rights than ours, but those are empty words. Russia's Constitution is evidence of this."

"Thank God for our Constitution and thank God you respect it." he said in closing. "Our Constitution guarantees our right to OPPORTUNITY. A citizen cannot ask more than that from its government."

Thank you Congressmen Atwood, for your inspiring reflections and presentation.
