Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) Recipient

We've met Maria Trabanino before. This impressive 18-year-old College of Coastal Georgia freshman has been our guest at Rotary since first introduced as our 2012-2013 Georgia Rotary Student (GRSP) – a privilege our club shares with the Rotary Clubs of Camden, Brunswick and Kingsland.

This visit, Maria took to the podium to tell us a little bit about herself and her country, El Salvador. An honor student, Maria has been active back at home in CISV – a global fellowship organization. Her compelling PowerPoint presentation was entertaining to watch as she described El Salvador with pride using electronic media to her advantage with help from a YouTube movie from the El Salvador Turismo. As her presentation described, El Salvador is the smallest nation in Central America – about the size of Massachusetts. Their currency is the U.S. Dollar. Their government is a Constitutional Republic now led by the progressive FMLN (Farabundo Martí National Liberation Front) party since an election in 2009. El Salvador's political history had been marred by military dictatorships and revolution including a civil war between military and communist factions which lasted for 12 long years. A peace agreement in 1992 ended the tragic turmoil which had taken 75,000 lives.

Today, El Salvador is popular for tourism—known for its 307 km (190 miles) of beautiful beaches and coastline on the Pacific Ocean, 21 magnificent volcanoes, 4 major Mayan antiquity sites, and some of the world's greatest surfing! Not to mention its fine coffee bean product.
